# **Keynote Speakers**

Christine Low, "Women Influencing Policy":

The National Council of Women of NZ is an umbrella organisation that is governed and managed by volunteers at both local and national level.

NCWNZ has been influencing policy at local, national and international levels since 1896.

NCWNZ is one of the few organisations who regularly consult their membership on issues affecting women and their families. The consultation process involves researching previous policy and seeking comment from the diverse membership. The submissions that result from this process are then used when consulting with central government and other organisations seeking lay or consumer points of view. NCWNZ have used surveys to gather the opinion of women on a particular topic and worked with academic institutions to analyse and present the results.

In addition NCWNZ facilitates the consultation and report writing on the NGO Shadow Report to CEDAW (United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women).

Professor Gregor will look at the questions of what, where and when you should publish, keeping in mind a balance between personal goals and the goals of your university and also between short-term and long-term strategies. She will also look at factors that can help or hinder in the research publication process.

Drawing on her 25 years' experience in the domestic violence prevention field, the presenter will discuss the role and limitations of feminist ideology and research in responding to domestic and family violence. Focusing on the Queensland context, the presentation will include discussion of grassroots feminist activism, the emergence of government policy and programs, the need for 'evidence' to underpin policy and programs, and the establishment of a tri-partite partnership between the state-government, Central Queensland University and the domestic and family violence sector to provide this evidence, through the establishment of the Queensland Centre for Domestic and Family Violence Research. In particular, the presenter will discuss how different feminist perspectives have shaped responses to domestic and family violence, the relevance of this to diverse groups of women, and the strategies used by the Queensland Centre for Domestic and Family Violence Research to accommodate the diverse contexts for women in Queensland affected by domestic and family violence.
