Action in paediatric mental health

An increase in admissions of children with mental health problems prompted nurses in a general paediatric unit at Rockhampton Hospital in Queensland to launch an action research project. The project has enhanced an overall sense of improved knowledge, skills and confidence among the nursing staff in the paediatric unit for the benefit of children experiencing mental health problems.

The nurses noted an increase in the admissions of children with mental health problems and felt they lacked the skills and knowledge to provide sufficient care to the children. A series of focus groups were conducted to articulate the problem and identify potential solutions.

A significant outcome of this project has been an increased awareness within the Central Queensland Health Service District of

the issues faced by general nurses in providing care to children and adolescents with mental health problems within a rural paediatric unit. While many research projects end at this point, this one has resulted in changes in practice including:

- Strengthening relationships between the paediatric unit and child and youth mental health services.
- A review of the current procedures and policies for admission and care of patients with a mental health issue in the paediatric unit was undertaken, with six revised policies being introduced.
- A management plan for paediatric patients with a mental health issue was implemented to facilitate staff in identifying risk factors and specific resource requirements.
- A series of education sessions and workshops were held on various aspects of paediatric mental disorders and mental health care.
- A series of "In 'Ya Face Education" posters were produced covering a range of topics concerning paediatric mental disorders and mental health care. These were strategically located on the toilet doors for maximum effect.
- A mental health learning package for general nurses in the paediatric unit was developed for inclusion in the existing orientation package.
